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Letter From Our President & CEO

The past year has brought a constant flurry of unsettling news. Institutions we thought invulnerable have been shuttered and supports that our communities relied on have disappeared. For Graham, this is not new. For nearly 220 years, Graham has persevered through some of the most trying times in American history and persisted in providing the support folks tell us they need to *survive, grow, and thrive*. We are continuing to forge ahead in the present moment, collaborating to create and implement innovative strategies so that everyone can lead healthy, joyful, and successful lives.

This past year, we successfully concluded Graham's Vision 2025 and embarked on our ambitious strategy for Vision 2029. I am excited to share the significant accomplishments we made with our Vision 2025 goals of helping youth and families achieve their dreams, helping families in crisis heal, changing biased systems and fighting inequity, and building a thriving OneGraham culture.

This report also highlights the exciting strides we have begun to make with Vision 2029, as well as a preview of our future plans to achieve our targets over the next four years:

- Reimagine, create, and launch compassionate family support by advocating for change, focusing on equity, and eliminating harm caused by biased and oppressive systems.
- In partnership with community and in support of family strength and wellbeing: expand centers and offerings and deepen our commitment to local leadership development.
- Expand education, career, mental health, and concrete supports to help children, young adults and parents lead healthy and prosperous lives.
- Further advance our OneGraham culture.

Graham continues to be a leader in a movement we've called *The Reckoning*, addressing harms caused by the child welfare system as we move toward creating positive community supports for families. Throughout 2025, we engaged in conversations with parents, youth, foster parents, staff, and Board members and learned about supportive, community-based models that are alternatives to traditional systems. These efforts culminated in hosting our first Alternatives to Foster Care Summit, where we brainstormed to co-create new approaches that we would like to build at Graham. I am grateful for the support of friends and partners in engaging with this complex work, and I am inspired by the promise of building something new.

As we enter this new year and prepare to celebrate **220 years of innovative support** for children, families, and communities, I find comfort in knowing that we will make it through challenging times by continuing to stick together and supporting one another at every turn. With your generosity and dedication, we can continue to make a life-changing difference for families and communities who face difficult obstacles caused by poverty and racial injustice. Thank you for believing in our mission and the children, families, and communities we support.

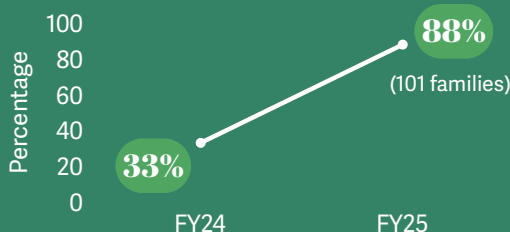

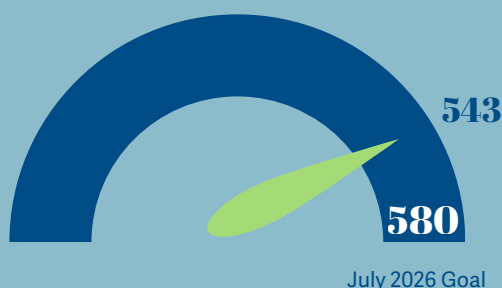

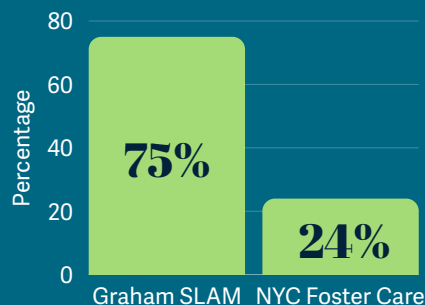

Vision Goal 1: Help Children and Families Achieve Their Dreams

>> Graham SLAM Expands to Reach More Youth

Our innovative Graham SLAM education and career coaching initiative was originally created to support youth in foster care. After listening to feedback from youth at our community centers, mental health clinics, and family support services who were seeking similar coaching to achieve their life goals, we set a goal to expand SLAM to reach youth across all Graham supports. Thanks to the generous contributions of private donors, we hired 10 additional SLAM coaches and two “Graham-grown” supervisors. With the support of these new roles, we have already paired 180 additional youth with SLAM Coaches for a total of **543 youth coached in SLAM.**

>> Enrollment in Excellent High Schools Rises

Vision 2025 set out to expand community center supports to help youth and families thrive. Modeled on our foster care education team, we hired Middle School Specialists to engage youth at our Cornerstone and Beacon Community Centers in Hunts Point and Harlem. Using a One Graham approach to NYC public high school selection, these Specialists and our Foster Care education team helped parents and middle school youth through the complex application process, helping them learn about schools with Excellent ratings and high graduation rates. Thanks to the support of these staff, during 2025, **65% (113) of 8th graders at our community centers and 8th graders in foster care enrolled in these Excellent high schools**—an impressive statistic compared with 40% of youth across NYC.

>> Entrepreneurial Classes Support Hunts Point Community Vision

We collaborated with the Hunts Point/Longwood community to create a vision for how O.U.R. Place Family Enrichment Center could most effectively support local community members. In response to this co-creation process, O.U.R. Place began offering training and career coaching workshops for community members in 2022. Since then, **over 300 community members have participated in Taking Care of Business workshops**, learning new skills like tailoring, food preparation, and barbering, and receiving support to attain licenses for professional advancement. We have also **awarded 203 small business microgrants.**

Vision Goal 2: Help Families in Crisis Heal



Families Thrive After Graduating from Our Family Support & Empowerment Offerings

Historically, most of the families in Graham's Family Support and Empowerment (FSEP) program were referred to Graham by the NYC Administration for Children's Services as a result of a child welfare investigation. To better provide helpful help™ and help families heal without a child protective investigation, we have evolved our practice to connect with more families directly through schools, clinics, and word of mouth. Throughout Vision 2025, the number of families we reached directly in FSEP increased from 4% to 29%, above our 25% goal. We have now raised that goal to 50% for Vision 2029. Families who graduate from Family Support and Empowerment continue to see impressive outcomes: **98% of families who graduated from our Family Support & Empowerment offerings had no child protective findings of abuse or neglect within six months.**



Youth Achieve Improved Mental Health Outcomes

Graham is one of only a few New York City organizations that runs standalone mental health clinics focused on children and adolescents from low-income families. Throughout Vision 2025, Graham's Mental Health Clinic continued to help youth heal by providing excellent, responsive, trauma-focused mental health care through the use of evidence-based approaches, at no cost to families. In 2025, **80% of children and adolescents working with our skilled therapists experienced improved mental wellness by the end of treatment.**



Essential Needs Fund Supports Families Experiencing Poverty

In 2024, The NYC Administration for Children's Services conducted over 51,000 investigations of allegations of abuse or neglect reported to the New York State Central Register. In NYC, these investigations of primarily Black, Hispanic, and poor families resulted in 22% of substantiated findings, with most being findings of neglect due to poverty-related issues. Families may be separated by foster care because of stressors brought on by not being able to afford housing, groceries, clean laundry, or internet service.

Families have told us that truly helpful help™ includes support with meeting basic needs, and we evolved our practice to meet these needs in Vision 2025. Generous gifts from Board members as well as an annual grant from the Mother Cabrini Health Foundation allowed us to create an Essential Needs Fund and achieve our goal of meeting the basic needs of families by providing support with food, clothing, housing (rent and maintenance assistance), and cash assistance. When the federal government halted funds for food assistance (SNAP) this past fall, additional funders and partners stepped up, including Tiger Foundation, and we were able to increase our giving to help meet the needs of families in the Graham community.

Vision Goal 3: Change Biased Systems and Fight Inequity



Reckoning Movement Leads Change to Child Welfare System

The *Reckoning* movement began from our goal to make tangible progress in dismantling racist policies and practices in systems that impact children and families. This ongoing series of convenings brings partners together to discuss harm caused by the child welfare system and to dream about how to develop community-based alternatives to the existing system. Since launching the series in 2024, we have co-hosted four *Reckoning* convenings with partner organizations, engaged in 27 conversations with parents, youth, foster parents, staff, and Board members, and hosted an Alternatives to Foster Care Summit.

Advocating for Family Rights and Humane CPS Assessments

We have worked to change community conditions that currently lead to family crises, such as racial and gender biases in mandated reporters and child protective workers, and advocate for more humane Child Protective Services (CPS) assessments. Graham led efforts with partners and actively met with government officials to advocate for the Anti-Harassment in Reporting bill, which Governor Hochul signed into law in December 2025. This will now require reporters of suspected child abuse to provide their name and contact information to the statewide central register. Thousands of parents, foster parents, and children have been subjected to baseless, terrifying, sometimes repeated investigations, based on malicious reporting by an individual with a grievance. We expect that replacing anonymous reporting with confidential reporting will deter a significant amount of false reporting.

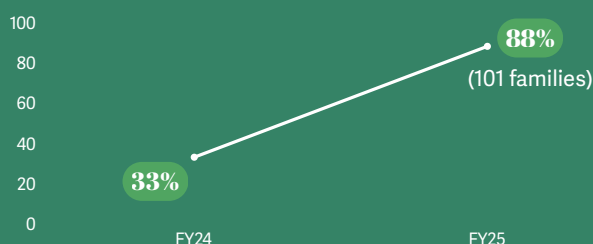
Graham is currently advocating for two other bills to support family's rights. The Family Miranda Rights Act would require CPS workers to advise caregivers of their legal rights at the start of an investigation. The Maternal Health Dignity and Consent Act would remove the right of hospitals to test new mothers for drugs and alcohol without consent. Currently, this testing is applied punitively and disproportionately to Black, Hispanic, and poor mothers.



Engagement with School-Based Early Support Soars

We are proud to work with seven school partners across Harlem and the South Bronx to provide helpful help™ for families experiencing challenges caused by poverty, while avoiding unnecessary child protective investigations. In 2025, **88% (101) of families self-enrolled in School-Based Early Support (SBES)** to receive help with essential needs, access to government benefits, parenting skills workshops, and support with school engagement.

Vision Goal 4: Build a Thriving One Graham Culture

>> Opening Two New Youth & Family Centers

We are continuing to create a consistent look and feel to our spaces that is welcoming, enriching, and mitigates against toxic stress and trauma. As part of our Vision planning, we heard that families want safe, welcoming, and multi-use community centers that bring together recreation, mental health, learning, and career support under one roof. Last year, we opened the lower level of our Tremont Youth & Family Center in the Bronx to support children, families, communities, and staff. We also hired a Director of Community Support and Leadership at this center to provide concrete needs and engage parents and community members around offerings.

>> Building on Staff Psychological Safety

In alignment with our commitment to developing just, anti-racist, and inclusive practices, our Anti-Black Racism Committee led work to improve staff's psychological safety. The committee conducted the third in a series of staff surveys to gauge how safe staff feel to share their perspectives and speak up when conflict arises. To support the ability of staff to have courageous conversations, the committee brought a new staff coaching resource to Graham. Two members of our Talent Development and Support team also became certified life coaches, and they continue to provide support to staff to help with communication and professional growth.

We continued to see high utilization of the coaching platform Bravely, with staff completing 248 Bravely sessions to help build professional skills and navigate workplace challenges.

In 2025, we renovated our Central Harlem Youth & Family Center, which hosts mental health clinicians, Graham SLAM coaches, and our family support teams all in one space. We are excited to offer family and community supports in spaces that are free from stigma and easy to access.

» Reckoning Convenings Explore Alternatives to Foster Care

Graham continues to be a leader in a movement we've called *The Reckoning*, addressing harms caused by the child welfare system as we move toward creating positive community supports for families. In September, we hosted a collaborative Summit that brought together parents, youth, foster parents, staff, Board members, and community partners. Participants reviewed key insights from 27 *Reckoning* conversations held over the past year, explored community-based alternatives to traditional systems, and brainstormed new approaches that better support families. In November, Graham and the New

York City Narrowing the Front Door Work Group co-hosted "Putting Families First: The Other Side of The Reckoning, An Urgent Community Conversation" at the New School. The powerful convening discussed reckoning with harm to rebuild a future rooted in family justice and integrity, with our President & CEO, Kimberly Watson, sharing her own family's story of involvement with the child welfare system.

Vision 2029 Early Progress

Vision Goal 1: Develop alternatives to foster care that eliminate harm

>> 27 Reckoning Sessions Engage Graham Community

As part of Vision 2029, we will develop models for supporting families outside of the child welfare system and build new models for supporting families in crisis or when poverty is the main risk factor, so children can remain with their families whenever possible. From September 2024 through August 2025, we hosted 27 *Reckoning* sessions with parents, youth, foster parents, and staff. These sessions invited participants to share their experiences with the harms caused by systems and to brainstorm what helpful family support should look like in the future. We also engaged a consultant to study existing models of support that keep families together.

This work led to our first Alternatives to Foster Care Summit in September 2025, when we brought together parents, youth, foster parents, staff, Board members, and community partners. The Summit shared out these models of support and engaged participants in breakout groups to brainstorm ideas and co-create supports that could work for families in NYC. We are now bringing together smaller groups to co-design pilots that we will seek funding to launch.

Vision Goal 2: In partnership with community, provide support for family wellbeing

>> NY BRICKS Grant to Renovate Tremont Youth & Family Center

As part of Vision 2029, we will build vibrant stand-alone community centers that provide trusted help and resources. In December, we received a NY BRICKS grant award for \$5 million to renovate our Tremont Youth and Family Center in the Bronx. NY BRICKS is part of Governor Kathy Hochul's "Unplug and Play" initiative to provide funds for community center renovations, with priority given to centers in underserved areas. This grant is on top of \$375,000 that we have already raised for the Center's renovations and furnishings from Bronx Borough President Vanessa L. Gibson, Senator Luis Sepulveda, and The Hyde and Watson Foundation.

Having completed our renovation of the center's courtyard level last spring, this grant will help us revitalize the first floor, the façade, and the exterior entrance, create new community garden spaces on the roof and in the courtyard, and complete needed upgrades. We are grateful for these early funders as we begin this full building revitalization project in 2026.

Vision 2029 Early Progress

Vision Goal 3: Help youth and families lead healthy, prosperous lives

Graham WORKS Pilot Concept Introduced

We are helping young adults reach a living wage career pathway by age 26 through establishing employer partnerships. At our 2025 Annual Meeting, we introduced the concept for Graham WORKS, our new youth economic opportunity initiative. Graham WORKS is collaborating with Graham SLAM and workforce partners to provide young adults with hands-on workforce experience and connections to quality internships.

Centralizing Resources in Response to Food Insecurity

When federal SNAP food assistance benefits were paused at the start of November, members of the Graham community pulled together at a critical hour to centralize resources for essential needs and make sure families got what they needed.

- We formed a Food Security Task Force, and started the Graham Cares initiative to share community resources and partner with local organizations that can meet food needs.
- We are implementing robust food supports for families and community members, thanks to generous Board member donations and an unexpected grant from the Tiger Foundation.
- We re-launched our Thrive Fund to support Graham staff experiencing hardship, thanks to a generous donation from a Board member.
- We hosted Farm to Table food giveaway events at three of our sites – in the Bronx, Harlem, and in Brooklyn.

Vision Goal 4: Further advance our thriving One Graham culture

Implementing Dashboards for Outcomes & Productivity Data

We have made investments in technology so we readily have the tools to inform decisions, solve problems, communicate well across teams, increase efficiencies, and enhance the quality of our work. Our Program Performance and Planning team has developed interactive Dashboards to show data visually and give staff easy access to productivity and outcomes data for children, youth, and families. This data, updated daily, provides information, patterns, and insights to support team collaboration and decision making, and to track progress toward our Vision goals.

Celebrating 220 Years of Innovative Support

In 2026, we are celebrating our milestone 220th anniversary! Graham is the country's oldest non-religious child and family-caring organization. We have been providing helpful help™ since 1806—founded by remarkable women who were exceptional leaders in the early days of American democracy.

Today, Graham provides life-changing support for children, families, and communities facing difficult obstacles. We co-create innovative solutions so everyone can lead healthy, joyful, and successful lives.



Looking Ahead

As we enter the second year of our Vision 2029 plan, we are celebrating significant achievements while continuing to dream big about the future.

In 2026, we will focus our energy and resources on these priorities:

- **Reimagine, create, and launch compassionate family support by advocating for change, focusing on equity, and eliminating harm caused by biased and oppressive systems.**
 - Alternatives to Foster Care Co-Design Workgroups will synthesize feedback from our 2025 Summit and learn from international models to map out pilot initiatives for supporting families in crisis or when poverty is the main risk factor, so children can remain with their families whenever possible.
 - We will hold a second Summit to receive feedback and refine the concepts before seeking funding to implement pilots.
- **In partnership with community and in support of family strength and wellbeing: expand centers and offerings and deepen our commitment to local leadership development.**
 - Following the plan developed by our Community Center Strategy Workgroup, we will continue raising money to renovate the entire building of the Tremont Youth & Family Center. The renovated space will be a vibrant stand-alone community center that provides trusted help and resources.
 - We will sustain and expand community engagement in Tremont and Hunts Point as well as meet essential needs, and expand these approaches to additional communities, next at our newly-opened Central Harlem Youth & Family Center.
- **Expand education, career, mental health, and concrete supports to help children, young adults and parents lead healthy and prosperous lives.**
 - We will continue to expand Graham SLAM, making progress toward our near-term milestone of providing coaching to 580 youth overall and continue raising funds to grow even further toward our goal of coaching 900 youth by 2029.
 - We will expand the scope of Graham WORKS, our new youth economic opportunity initiative to help young adults reach a living wage career path by 26. This initiative collaborates with Graham SLAM, employers, and workforce partners to provide young adults with hands-on workforce experience and connections to quality internships.
 - We will sustain our employment and entrepreneurial supports for parents and community members at O.U.R. Place Family Enrichment Center, with plans to expand this support to parents at our Tremont Youth & Family Center.
- **Further advance our thriving OneGraham culture.**
 - We will renovate and re-open our Brooklyn Services & Administrative Office. The renovations will create more space for connection and collaboration across departments, as our Brooklyn Family Treatment & Rehabilitation team and administrative staff join together in one shared space.
 - To support our workforce, we will implement a refined learning and development strategy to focus on the competencies needed for Vision 2029, to invest in first-level supervisors' leadership development and coaching competency as well as help staff develop proficiency in practice models and direct their own individualized learning journeys.
